Family of faith

Notes on the Bible readings

• This passage revolves around two elderly people who have faithfully waited for this moment. Simeon and Anna represent quiet lives that have been devoted in service to God, which are nearing their end. They embody a spirit of patient waiting. But it is at this point that God interacts with each of them as they recognise the baby brought by his parents for the customary purification, as the one who would redeem their people.

Simeon's words of blessing move us from Mary's domestic focus to the cosmic significance of Jesus and the revelation that his birth will be for Israel and the Gentiles. However, his words are also guite disturbing as he speaks of oppression and tells Mary a sword will pierce her soul.

• The fact that both Simeon and Anna are named speaks of their importance within the story. There is great power in a name, it identifies you from others and signals something of the divine role God has for you. Who can we name as those in our own journey of faith who have had an impact on our growth and development?

Later in life

In a world where media attention is focused mostly on the young, do some research – you could share this out within a household - to find out about how our society tends to view and treat older people. The Age UK website is a good place to begin. Why is there a need for such a charity in the UK (and is this the same in other parts of the world)? What are the key issues, and what might you individually or together - do to help?
