


Acts 10:44-48 Surprised by God

Peter is preaching the gospel in Caesarea, and – just as at Pentecost – people are filled with the Holy Spirit. But these people are Gentiles. Those with Peter are astounded, but Peter knows this is because the gospel is for all people. The people are baptized and Peter stays with them for a while.

You can't always judge what's on the inside by looking at the outside! What can we learn about openness and acceptance from the story of Peter and Cornelius?

Bible notes



This is the climax of the story of Peter and Cornelius. Peter's surprising vision, urging him to eat all kinds of creatures, clean and unclean, is followed by an invitation from this Gentile God-fearer. When Peter finds out that he has been invited at the behest of an angel, he begins to 'truly understand that God shows

no partiality', and he preaches 'peace by Jesus Christ - he is Lord of all' (10:34-36). As he speaks, Cornelius the Gentile centurion, together with his relatives and close friends, receives the Holy Spirit. Peter recognises the work of God in this outpouring 'even on the Gentiles'. He realises, as he will later explain to the church in Jerusalem, that the Spirit is telling him 'not to make a distinction between them and us' (11:12), and they are baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. When Peter tells the Jewish Christians in Jerusalem what has happened, he says, 'who was I that I could hinder God?' (11:17), and hearing this they fall silent. Then they praise God who 'has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life' (11:18). God's word gradually unfolds and is increasingly accepted, by Peter's change of mind, in Cornelius' commitment, and in the renewed praises of the church in Jerusalem. Peter remembers the word of Jesus, who had said, 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit' (11:16, see Luke 3:16 and Acts 1:5).
