In one of Paul's richest theological reflections on the coming of Jesus, he talks about the crucified Christ as the invisible God made visible. True authority and power are not found in the pomp and might of Caesar, but in the humility and suffering of Jesus.

Living Scripture

'He is the image of the invisible God.' Colossians 1:15

Who is the most powerful person you can think of? If they came to your home, would there be bodyguards, an entourage, photographers, crowds?

In one of Paul's richest reflections on the coming of Jesus, he talks about the crucified Christ as the invisible God made visible. Paul tells his first hearers that true authority and power are not found in the might of the Roman Caesar, but in the humility and suffering of Jesus.

Jesus had all authority and power, and yet he laid it down to become human to bring peace between God and humanity. Jesus came to show us what God is like, and it's unexpected. Though God is powerful, we meet a humble, servant hearted, relationshiporiented God in Jesus. Paul goes on to say that when he shares about Christ, he also is humble, suffers, and prioritises relationship so that others can meet God.

Our culture values prestige, fame and wealth. We might not flaunt it, but we definitely try to hold on to it. Instead, Jesus models humility, service and suffering for the sake of others. He gives up his power to reach us. We may not feel powerful, but our choices can show the world what Jesus is like. Does your service, leadership, and treatment of others, point them to the invisible God made visible through Christ and his people?
