Sparkling Superheroes!

A fun way for children to celebrate God's light in the darkness

Prepare

Invite local primary-aged children for a 'light party' to celebrate Jesus' light. Presented as an alternative Halloween party, parents appreciate a safe alternative to 'trick-or-treating'. Or use as a single session holiday club in October half term.



Timing Plan the event for 31 October or the weekend immediately before Halloween, as the following weekend is usually when Bonfire events occur.

Logistics to consider

- Where will you put up posters (p.3) of the event, with date, time and who to RSVP to?
- When will you hand out invitation postcards (p.4)? Will you ask for volunteers to help distribute these around the local community?
- Will parents stay or drop children off?
- How will you engage parents who stay (a cup of tea and someone to speak with them), or, will they be helping run the event?
- What if older or younger siblings come along who are not primary-aged?
- What parental permissions are required: e.g. dietary requirements, first aid, photo permissions?
- Will you prompt families to RSVP (by a given date) so you ca prepare the right amount of food and supplies in advance?
- How many volunteers with a DBS will you need to safely supervise children?
- Check your safeguarding policies, food hygiene for catering, and do thorough risk assessment.

Welcome Provide lots of fun, sweets and prizes so children really enjoy themselves and ramilies feel welcome in your church space.

Pray for a positive impact in your community, connections with families who may not normally attend church, and so that children will feel loved and safe and can experience the light of Christ in their lives.

Decorate the space Use cardboard cut-outs to evoke a cityscape like Gotham or New York City. Alternatively, use red, yellow and blue balloons, and comic style word art and film posters on the walls.

Costumes Invite children (and adult volunteers) to come in fancy dress as superheroes or powerful prince/sses [like Elsa, Moana, invite or Merida, Eric, Flynn Rider, Aladdin].







The party

Welcome the children

Explain there will be numerous activities, followed by ood and a short talk. Depending on your space and the number of children, you can run the activities simultaneously or sequentially, It may help to group children by age so you can differentiate the level of challenge.

Icebreaker activity

Would you rather ...?

Ask the children to move from one side of the room to the other based on their answers to these questions.

Would you rather...

- Be able to fly or be invisible?
- Be super-fast or super strong?
- Be able to talk to animals or make plants grow?
- Have the power to move earth or control water?

Ask the children, in pairs or threes, to share what super power they would like and why.



Gather the children in your main space and provide a simple meal, like hot dogs (both veggie and meat, check for allergies), served with superhero/princess themed napkins. If someone in your church likes decorating cookies or cupcakes, give them the superhero theme (link redacted). While everyone is seated and eating dessert, present a short talk.
